## Watch Two Short Videos

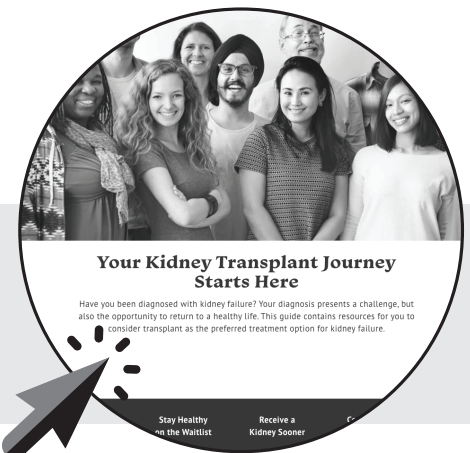
